
Judd XC Virtual Charity Run

Virtual Charity Run


Earlier in the year, Year 11 student Henry Bretz (pictured after his run!) organised a virtual charity run with the support of the sports department in order to raise money for NHS Charities Together. The event was well received

by staff, students and OJs alike with over 160 participants signing up



The aim was to run as far as cumulatively possible. As the run was virtual, everyone could record their distance and upload it whilst still abiding by the Government guidelines on social distancing.

The run was a huge success, with a total distance of 1914 km being covered over the course of the day! The combined efforts of staff (including Ben Headon - right), students and OJs raised £5,690 for health care workers across the NHS.



Our Developing Digital Strategy

Like everyone else adapting to working from home, we too have had to quickly change our approach to delivering lessons online and facilitating home learning using digital resources. Thankfully, the recent transition to Google for Education has meant we were in an excellent position to quickly adapt. Staff have had to quickly learn new skills - such as running lessons over Google Meet and have redesigned schemes of work so that they are deliverable over the internet. They have risen to the challenge and I thank them for how quickly they have

Just as we entered lockdown, we made the decision to purchase GCSEPod. This has proven hugely popular with students as it breaks learning down into smaller chunks, giving them the ability to focus on their own area of weakness, testing themselves as they go.

At the end of May, Judd was identified as being in the top 10 schools in the country for GCSEPod usage indicating that our students have been making very good use of this resource.



Judd Engineering Society

Members of the student organised Judd Engineering Society have been working to support care homes, hospitals, key workers and local businesses over the lockdown period, by designing and manufacturing accessories that relieve the strain of wearing vital PPE for prolonged periods of time.

Following my nomination, Linklaters hosted a series of virtual webinars as preparation for the Grand Final but also as further insight into the law firm itself. Joining this competition has given me lots of new ideas about how the corporate world works. During these webinars, we

were introduced to people working in the different sectors of the law firm and got to hear what their everyday routine looks like as well as some tips for applying. The Grand Final itself involved submitting a self-recorded video where you discuss your essay title in more depth. In preparation for this, public speaking coaches attended the webinars and gave us useful information about how to make our presentations more interesting and interactive. It was a challenging but rewarding experience.

Not only has this benefitted me, but Linklaters have also provided extra funding to the school, where it will be used to finance more law books for the school library as well as the Bar Mock Trial competition for the lower school. Like many students, I am unsure about my future career however I hope these investments will help other students find their passion and find what their future career might look like.



Some of our Triumphs

Olympiad Successes! - Biology

Year 12 students were able to take part in a remote Intermediate Biology Olympiad which took place in early June with great success: 5 gold medals, 6 silver medals and 7 bronze medals as well as 9 high commendations and 3 commendations. Congratulations to all!

Following his earlier success in the first round of the British Biology Olympiad and a challenging second round, John Mulford placed in the top 4 out of over 9,000 students to represent the UK in the International Biology Olympiad. This was due to take place in Japan but due to the Covid-19 pandemic, it will now take place remotely during August. We congratulate him and wish him the best of luck!



German

Chamika took part in the Oxford German Olympiad and submitted an essay on the topic of nature and technology. He received the excellent news that he won the competition.

Chamika also applied for a highly competitive work shadowing programme organised by the Goethe Institute that had an unprecedented high number of applicants, and needs to be congratulated for obtaining a placement in Schwäbisch-Hall.

Duke of Edinburgh

The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme run at The Judd School has had its most successful year to date with the highest amount of DofE Awards achieved: 121 - 113 Silver (6 from Year 13, 36 from Year 12 and 71 from Year 11) and 8 Gold DofE Awards were achieved by Year 13 participants.

DofE Headquarters confirmed that 3211 hours of physical activities, 3887 hours of working towards a skill, 3302 hours of volunteering were completed by the above participants.

A huge range of activities were chosen from each section ranging from: cooking at home to go-karting and forestry in the skills section; rugby and cricket were the most popular activities chosen in the physical section; and within the volunteering section, many participants committed their time to working in charity shops as well as helping out at Cubs and community shops.

Year 11 Silver DofE participants also completed a practise expedition in The Ashdown Forest in May 2019 followed by a very successful assessed expedition in a brand-new location in The South Downs.

Finally, thank you to the many teaching and support staff who volunteered their time to help out with the training weekends and on the expeditions and learnt to enjoy camping in all weathers. Luckily, the weather was perfect expedition weather last Summer!

Fly Lab Gold CREST Award



Anna, Maisie, Rhea and Sabrina were recently awarded a Gold CREST Award in recognition of their work in Fly Lab. The group investigated the effects of different concentrations of alcohol on Drosophila melanogaster and wrote an extensive report for submission to CREST. Their project was praised for being well written and communicated with thorough planning and fulfilled 13 out of the 15 criteria.

This is an excellent achievement especially considering experiments had to stop in March, well done! We look forward to hearing of the success of the other five groups who will be submitting reports soon.

After a year of planning and organising, the new school garden has recently been completed. Designed by members of the Judd Eco Committee as a quiet space for staff, students and wildlife, it includes an evolution trail, mini-orchard, greenhouse, wildflower area, pond and raised beds.

Although the work was completed the week we went into lockdown, we are delighted to say it is still being





used by our students who are children of key workers to grow carrots, beetroot, potatoes, spring onions, parsnips, pumpkins, courgettes and even melons in the greenhouse!
