

Our first term back without many restrictions has been such a revelation. I regaled parents with our plans for the school's development over the coming years and chatted over a glass of wine to those who had put their trust in us to educate their children without so much as an Open Evening to judge (those returned too this Autumn!).

Finally, before an update on the many academic, musical and sporting activities of the term, may I take this chance to thank everyone in the school community for their stoicism in getting to this point: to parents for your unerring support, to staff for their energy and enthusiasm in getting back to close to normal, to students for their engagement this term and to Governors for their support.

We were each given a Christmas hat which really put people in the Christmas spirit. At the same time there was also a Christmas Bazaar that was chock-full of activities. The event was for our 2 school charities, and a total of £914.27 was raised for them thanks to the combined efforts of the teachers who organised it and the prefects who helped out in running the event. The atmosphere was incredible, especially when combined with my favourite part which had to be the music. As we listened to so many of the Christmas




JPA - Thank you!

We were delighted, at the start of the school year, to be able to once again celebrate our students' success with Prize Giving in September; the first being our **Senior Prize Giving (Skinners' Day)** event at Tonbridge School. In front of families, friends and Governors, the Master (Sarah Stallebrass) presented prizes to Year 12 & 13 students, and certificates for their academic achievements in 2021 for all our Y13 students.



It was also an opportunity for the students to hear excellent speeches from outgoing Head Boy, John Mulford, and Deputy Head Girl, Rebecca Roodt, together with words of wisdom from the Master, the Chair of Governors (Charles Doyle), and (to a lesser degree) myself as we wished them every success as they move on to the next phase of their education.

Later in the month we invited nearly 100 of our younger students and their families to a **Junior Prize Giving** event at school. As well as hearing from the Chair of Governors, the Headteacher, and the Deputy Head Prefects, they heard an inspirational speech from guest speaker, Old Juddian and Paralympian, Zak Skinner. Zak is currently double European Champion in the 100m and Long Jump, and recently finished 4th at his first Paralympic Games, an agonising 2cm behind an Olympic medal, but 43cm ahead of his next rival. He inspired us all with his stories of determination and resilience.

Cross Country



The Judd School took a small army of runners to Newquay for the English Schools Cup final last Saturday after qualifying for the junior boys, inter boys, senior boys and senior girls races.

The junior boys (year 7 and 8) race saw Judd finish an amazing 3rd in the Country, finishing behind schools from Essex and Durham. Over a 3k course, run in high winds and occasional hailstorms, the team was led home by James Petrie in 8th place, followed by Charlie Warren in 21st, William Bachelor with his best ever race in 28th, Campbell South 54th, Harry Lawrence 65th and Toby Gwinnell in 69th place.

Over the 4.5km course the intermediate boys team finished as the best team in the South East, finishing in 6th place with Oliver Head running as one of the fastest year 9s in the race finishing 11th, followed by Oliver Clements in 39th, Daniel Jeddo in 41st, Felipe Fujimori in 60th and Mark Bridger finishing 85th.

The event saw senior races for the first time in its history, with the winners potentially being awarded a place in the World Schools Cross Country Championships in Slovakia next year.

The senior girls team finished a creditable 19th place out of 25 teams that had qualified through area and regional rounds to get to the national finals. The team of Annabelle Hales (34th), Lydia Hawker (66th), Sophie Preston (83rd), Lucy Clements (98th) and Lilly Sheppard (108th) represented Judd superbly in tough conditions.

The highlight of the day came in the last race as Judd were **crowned the first ever senior English Schools Cup winners** with a totally dominant display. Judd managed to get 6 runners home before any other school had 4, as they won with easily the best score in any of the boys races. Captain Matthew Dubery ran in a leading pack all the way round and finished on the individual podium position of 3rd place in his best ever race, closely followed by Jamie Macdonald in 6th place, Josh Prendergast in 15th, George Hopkins in 21st, Rhys Page in 33rd and Ben Pearce in 35th, continuing their unbeaten season so far, after collecting 4 trophies before adding this national title to their collection
